*The American Presbyterian Mission was opened in Allahabad in 1836. Two missionaries were transferred to China, but it wasn't until 1861 that they were able to baptise the first convert. At Shanghai the extensive printing operations of the Society were carried on. These comprised not only several presses which were constantly at work, but a foundry where seven sizes of Chinese type, besides English, Korean, Manchu, Japanese, Hebrew, Greek and others were cast. A rare survival. [not in Updike; not in Bigmore & Wyman; no copy in St. Bride, not in OCLC].



Engelmann is considered to be the first lithographic printer in France.

As a bookcollector, he is said to have attempted to secure a complete series of all the Greek classics ever published; he purchased privately R. Mead's Greek manuscripts, the papers of Dr. Taylor and some fine early classics codices from the library of the Maffei family. His sale (13 February 1775) was a great success and was attended by the Paris bookseller De Bure, who



*With a drop-head title beginning "The sacred interpreter: or, a practical introduction towards..." Thomas Astley was a bookseller and publisher in London, St. Paul's Churchyard, 1726-1759. He was mentioned in Wilford's Monthly Catalogue for September, 1726, as the publisher of the Rev. Thobias Swinden's Enquiry into the Nature and place of Hell. He also dealt in plays and miscellaneous literature. On April 3rd, 1747, in company with Edward Cave of St. John's Gate, he was arrested for printing an account of the trial of Simon Lord Lovat. After a strict examination by the House of the Lords, he was discharged upon paying the fines. Thomas Astley died on February 28th, 1759. McKenzie lists Astley twice in his book on apprentices in the book field (McKenzie's Stationers' Company Apprentices). The first four and a half pages describe in greater detail more modern titles and the rest of the pamphlet lists in short-title a large number of other titles in print. 



* Baillet was, from 1680 to his death, librarian to M. de Lamoignon, advocat-general to the parlement of Paris, of whose library he produced a manuscript catalogue raisonné in 35 folio volumes. It seems ironic that one should need to cosult Barbier to discover the author of this pioneering work, but the effort is rewarding, for here we read that - Cet ouvrage [était] le premier publié en France sur ce genre de recherches bibliographiques. The subject is approached from various angles, the psychology of pseudonymity, the various types of cognomes etc. This was a preliminary treatise, which should have been followed by a Recueil des Auteurs Déguisés but unfortunately the author died in 1706 leaving his work unfinished, and it was not for another 100 years, with the publica-



tion of Barbier's Dictionnaire des Ouvrages Anonymes in 1806, that the project was finally completed. In his preface Barbier pays eloquent tribute to the erudition of his predecessor.

* Interesting presentation. The 23rd example is the folder itself with text. Born in Versec, Hungary, in 1900, Imre Reiner (1900 - 1987) was a Hungarian Jew, although he lived most of his life in Switzerland. From 1921 he attended the Kunstgewerbeschule in Stuttgart, where he studied under Professor F. H. Ernst Schneidler. He continued to learn from Schneidler as a masterclass student of his at the Akademie der Bildenden Künste in Stuttgart until 1927. It was Professor Schneidler

who introduced him to type design. Schneidler worked for the Bauer Type Foundry in Stuttgart, and Reiner followed in his footsteps, producing his early type designs for the same foundry. His type Pepita was based on his own handwriting. Between 1923 and 1925, he worked as a graphic designer in London, Paris, New York and Chicago. However from 1931 he was based in Ruvigiliana, near Lugano, in Switzerland. There he worked as a painter, graphic designer and literary illustrator. He died aged 87 in Lugano. * Pope Benedict XIV (Prospero Laurenzo Lambertini - 1675-1758) was Pope from 1740 onwards. The Catholic Encyclopedia says: "Benedict XIV is best known to history as a student and scholar. Though by no means a genius, he was one of the most erudite men of his time and perhaps the greatest scholar among the popes... In spiritual matters his influence left a lasting impression on the Church and its administration. His Bulls and Encyclicals were learned treatises full of wisdom and scholarship... He founded four academies for the study of Roman antiquities, Christian antiquities, the history of the Church and the councils, and the history of canon law and liturgy. He also established a Christian museum, and commissioned Joseph Assemani to prepare a catalogue of the manuscripts in the Vatican Library, which he enriched by the purchase of the Ottobonian library containing 3,300 MSS of unique value and importance... Benedict's claim to immortality rests principally on his admirable ecclesiastical writings."

*The War of Devolution (1667–1668) saw Louis XIV's French armies overrun the Hapsburg controlled Spanish Netherlands. Louis's claims to the Spanish Netherlands were tenuous. His wife, Maria Theresa, the daughter of Philip IV, had renounced her rights of a Spanish inheritance in return for a large dowry at the time of her marriage. The dowry had yet to be paid, however. When Philip died in 1665, Louis' lawyers justified Louis's possible claims by arguing that, while Spanish laws of succession meant the throne of Philip IV would pass to his son Charles II, ancient laws of Duchy of Brabant ruled that the Spanish Netherlands could "devolve" to Philip's daughter from his first marriage, Louis's wife. France pressed the claim in 1667 and the present work was a kind of war announcement. The Latin edition was published the same year as the French one.



*The first 156 pages contain numerous important notes on the early history of printing in Italy, but also notes on bookbinding, dates, a list of useful bibliographies with notes etc. The last 211 pages contain a catalogue of the firm of Branca & Dupuy in alphabetical order with prices (pp. 3-152 Italian Books, pp. 153-187 French books & pp. 188-211 Latin books). This work is not in Bigmore & Wyman but they do mention two later catalogues/books by Branca alone and state that Carlo Branca was a long-established bookseller in Milan.

* First edition. One of the first books which systematically deals with playing cards, their production including paper, use and card history. The first volume, printed in 1784, contains panels of pictures of 21 tarot cards, German Piquet cards from the 15th and 17th century, patterns of German costumes, as well as examples of Chinese card and board games. The second chapter is illustrated with pictures of a Japanese papermill, as well as a German watermark. The very rare second volume of the interesting guide has a subtitle (translated into English from the German) of "Review to a history of the art of writing ..." and was published by J.C.F. Roch. This volume deals only with the art of writing, carving and illumination. It contains the "Research on the origin of wood-engraving, papers from 'Writing and Penmanship', 'Paintings in the Churches', 'Mosaic Painting and their Use

in the Churches', and 'Stained Glass and Painting in Manuscripts.' Johann Breitkopf (1719-1794) was an 18th-century Leipzig printer, type-founder, and bookseller who is credited by some with the invention of map-printing with moveable type. He introduced great improvements to letterpress music-types, and was an acquaintance of Goethe, some of whose earlier poems he set to music. for the greater part written in German are a.o. taken from the Bible; the last three give examples of "Fracturschrift", "Canzleyschrift" and "gemeinen Handschrift".



* Historically important catalogue, as it marks the revival of the famous Caslon old-style typeface which had fallen out of popularity for nearly half a century, during which time they had been replaced by the onslaught of the "modern" Didot and Bodoni typefaces. Credit for reviving Caslon's types goes to

Charles Whittingham and his Chiswick Press. In several books in the 1840s, Whittingham flew in the face of fashion and used the Caslon types on title pages, and in 1844 he published the first new book set entirely in Caslon, The Diary of Lady Willoughby. Although none of the romans and italics of Wm. Caslon are shown in this book, they were returning to favour as indicated by an advertisement on the leaf following the title "The



printers are respectfully informed, that, in addition to the contents of the following Modern Specimens, this Foundry includes the Works of the justly celebrated William Caslon, by whom it was originally established... Specimens of the original Caslon Foundry may be seen in Chiswell Street; but, being nearly out of print, cannot by generally circulated."The specimen leaves are printed on one-side only and are variously marked with the names: Caslon, Son, and Livermore; H. Much of the library went up in flames during the great palace fire of 1697 when 17,286 bound volumes and 1,103 manuscripts were lost. Only 6,700 volumes and 283 manuscripts survived. Celsius (1716-1794), was a librarian and wrote other histories of important libraries. [Almquist 2629].

* The imprint should be read as "à Sillé [le Guillaume] chez Deforge, rue de Mayenne". But the bookseller Deforge died in 1809 and this is in fact a pirate edition by Pierre-Jean-Aime é Chalopin, printer in Caen from 1777? to 1822. The chapbook takes its name from the itinerant 'Chapman' or street vendor, who included it as part of his stock-in-trade of buttons, laces, pins, ribbons, and other oddments. Like most of his stock the chapbook was sold for a penny. For many thousands of newly or partly literate readers it represented a first serious step in the world of literature; prior to its advent popular reading had been confined to single-sheet broadsides. Primitively printed, often from worn-out type and irrelevant second-hand woodblocks, the chapbook carried a miscellany of anecdotes, romantic tales, verses, riddles, puzzles



and jokes. The chapbook had clear advantages over a broadsheet: for the customer it had the distinction of being a 'book'; for the chapman it had the advantage of easier storage and portability and was far less fragile. * The Austrian National Library is nowadays the largest library in Austria. The library is located in the Hofburg Palace in Vienna. Founded by the Habsburgs, the library was originally called the 'Hof-Bibliothek' ("Imperial Library") the change to the current name occurred in 1920. Joseph Chmel (1798 - 1858) was librarian at the Stift St. Florian and later became head of the historical commission of the Academy of Science in Vienna.

* The protestant scholar Paul Colomiès (born at La Rochelle in 1638) was exiled to England where he became librarian to the Archbishop of Canterbury. It contains some of his most famous essays, such as his 'Life of Sirmond', and his French translation of 'Tertullian's Exhortation to the Martyrs.'

* One of the key acts that brought about the formation of the British Museum and Library. The library



of Sir Robert Cotton (1571-1631) is the most important collection ever assembled by a private individual in Britain. Amongst its many treasures are the Lindisfarne Gospels and the only surviving copy of Beowulf. Parliamentary legislation in 1701 (the present act) vested Cotton House and the library in a body of trustees, with effect from the death of Sir John Cotton - Cotton's grandson - which occurred in 1702. Four of the trustees were drawn from the family; the remaining three were great officers of state. In 1722 the library moved to Essex House in the Strand and then (because ironically, that building was thought to

be too much at risk from fire) in 1730 to Ashburnham House in Little Dean's Yard, Westminster. It was there, in 1731, that a chimney caught fire in the room below that in which the manuscripts were stored. By the time the blaze was extinguished, over 200 of the 950 Cottonian volumes had been destroyed or damaged, among them the Cotton Genesis and one of the two copies of Magna Carta. Following this disaster, the collection was transferred to the Old Dormitory of Westminster School. The Cottonian collection finally became one of the three foundation collections - the only one to have been obtained by gift - at the establishment of the British Museum in 1753.



* Courtonne, a fashionable Parisian house architect, was professor of architecture at the Académie Royale d'Architecture for the last ten years of his life. He was immensely influential on younger architects. The Traité was the result of fourteen years of study of perspective theory, which led Courtonne to determine that existing works on perspective were too obscure and without organisation of either method or material, and that there was a need for a comprehensive and methodical elementary text book on the whole topic of perspective. The present treatise, in which he synopsizes information from previous books on perspective, was written to fill this need. The illustrations, all designed by Courtonne, are executed by leading engravers of the period. [Millard, French # 56 but a second edition, Kat. Ornam. Berlin 4729].

* Edmund Curll (1675-1747) was a rather controversial person. According to Straus there never was a man who succeeded in irritating almost beyond endurance so many of his betters. And nothing could make him see the error of his ways: he just continued to irritate. If, for instance, objection was raised to some books of his of the bawdier kind, it would as likely as not be followed by another even more scandalously improper. If a furious author declared that a book of his, published by Curll, was wholly unauthorised, he would probably find that a second volume of his work was being advertised as corrected by the author himself. Occasionaly the bookseller went too far, and then there was trouble, sometimes wholly grotesque. He was frequently sued for libel and variously fined and even imprisoned for printing and publishing obscene and immoral books. In November 1725 Curll was once again found guilty and announced his retreat from bookselling. His son Henry was called on to step in the breach. Henceforth, it was decided things should continue much as it had been, except for an altered initial. That probably explains why this catalogue was printed for H. Curll rather than his father Edmund. Although officially he was retreated it was Edmund who ran the business. Straus dates this catalogue around 1726 or 1727: ... must, I think, have been issued either in the summer of 1726 or in the spring of 1727 [cf. Strauss, The Unspeakable Curll & Plomer, A dictionary of the printers and booksellers]. Scarce.





An educational method based on playing, instead of on religious

books. Louis Dumas, invented a new, easy system that he called 'le bureau typographique' based on the art of printing. Children use individual letters to compose words and phrases, like printers do, and play with the letters. It was a great success. In the present work he explains his method.

It is divided into seven parts: theology (176pp), law (86pp), medicine (60pp), books on 'miscellaneous' subjets (200pp), books in French (120pp), books in Italian, Spanish and English (24pp) and books in German (103pp). No prices were given but these were presumably quoted on request. Included are, of course, the books published by the Elzeviers still in print, and a vast number of other books printed in Holland, and the catalogue is therefore still of bibliographical value. It also served contemporary

scholars as a work of reference and may be considered a select universal bibliography [Breslauer & Folter # 68]. * This is a comprehensive aesthetic analysis and visual description of the church of the Invalides. It contains plans of both the old and the new church. Les Invalides was a home and hospital for aged and unwell soldiers founded by Louis XIV. Its first chapel, by Jules Hardouin Mansart is known as the Église Saint-Louis des Invalides and was finished in 1679. Shortly after the veterans' chapel was completed, Louis XIV commissioned Mansart to construct a separate private royal chapel referred to as the Église du Dôme from its most striking feature. Inspired by St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, the original for all Baroque domes, it is one of the triumphs of French Baroque architecture. The domed chapel is centrally placed to dominate the court of honour. 

- a work which no student of French typography can afford to be without. It was published from 1764 onwards and the second volume, published in 1766, contained a typespecimen nearly identical to the present work. The present work was published in 1764 work with a commercial aim, that is presenting his customers with all the types available from his foundry. We now of several editions of this work, all dated 1764 but the number of pages varies, with more or less items added, as is often seen in typespecimens either because the collection of types grew in the meantime, or because the specimen was assembled for a specific customer: from the first 128 pages, printed on one side only, so that the chosen type could be cut-out without damaging text on the verso, to the 250 pages of the specimen that were finally included in the manuel (but printed recto-verso). Included are: types in ordinary use, ornaments, types peculiar to particular countries, Hebrew and Greek types, music and plain-song, etc. etc. Our copy

seems identical to the one described by Marius Audin (who doesn't note the 128 pages printed on one side only). [Not in Birrell & Garnet].




* Albert van Saksen founded the Court of Friesland in 1499 in order to govern and adminster justice with the viceroy. But after the uprising against Spain the Court had to restrict itself to administering justice. The special legal library could only be used by members of the Court. Only the 12 councillors and the Procurator-General were allowed to borrow the books. Lawyers and others could consult the books in the library but not borrow them. The clerk of the court was also the librarian. Lawbooks were the major category at the library but there were also theological, historical philological works and the better literary authors were also represented in Latin, French and Dutch. A manuscript catalogue of this important collection appeared in 1634. The library then contained around 450 works. The first printed catalogue appeared in 1668 when the collection had grown to 870 works. In 1733 the second one appeared (1031 works) and the present work of 1776, compiled by Simon Binkes and Johan van Idsinga as decreed by the court on 6 Mai 1774, is the third and last printed catalogue of the collection. It is

divided into two parts: an alphabetical and a systematical part. In 1776 the collection had grown to 1325 titles (679 folios, 443 quartos and 193 smaller formats) that were held in 15 bookcases. The Hof van Friesland library at the end of the 18th century was undoubtedly the largest and most scholarly library of all the Court libraries in the Netherlands. In 1811 the Court ceased to exist and since 1911 the still nearly complete collection is housed at the Provinsjale en Buma Library of Fryslân where the books are still arranged as in our 1776 catalogue. 

* According to Bléchet, the collections was originally to be sold en block but in fact it was sold at auction between 12 May and 2 August 1738. The



collection belonged to the celebrated book collector Count Karl Heinrich Hoym (1794-1738) who was the former Polish ambassador in France. He committed suicide in 1738; the present catalogue was edited by Gabriel Martin, (1679-1761), the famous French bookseller and bibliographer. It was he who introduced a new system of classification for (auction) catalogues, no longer by size but by themes. He has edited no less than 150 catalogues and the Hoym collection was one of the most elaborate ones. Martin knew Hoym and had played a role in forming the collection. He for instance bought several important books for Hoym at the du Fay sale in 1725. The Hoym collection contained no less than five Grolier bindings. year numerous schoolbooks were illustrated with comparable woodcuts. The 'Floretus' consists of a text in rhythmic prose for easy memorization and an anonymous explanatory commentary. The work is as-



scribed to Saint Bernard (1090 - 1153), Abbot of Clairvaux, which under his direction soon became one of the chief centres of the Cistercian Order. The prices range from 180 rupees for a run of the 'Edinburgh Review' to one rupee for 'Fothergill on the suspension of vital action'. At the end of the list the bookseller ends with a note: "N.B. The Books will not be sold at lower prices, than those affixed to them." The remainder of the newspaper is mainly comprised of advertisements with the news items, partly printed in the two Indian languages, confined to the last page. A rare survival.



present time. This superiority is due to the fact that the 'Etablissements Alphonse Wyns' have rediscovered the old process which gave such value to the Japanese and Chinese printing of the past centuries."

This book has also been called the Land of Living Men or the Acre of the Undying and is the only title printed twice at the press. First in 1891 as the first book of the press before Crane had time to design illustrations for it. That first edition, a small quarto, is illustrated only with initials and ornaments. This larger format illustrated edition has 23 wood engravings in various sizes by A. Leverett after Walter Crane, each enclosed in a decorative wood engraved border. Neither the borders in this



book, nor six out of the seven frames around the illustrations appear in any other book. Finely printed in Troy and Chaucer type in red and black, with a wood engraved title page facing the first text page which bears a full page wood engraved foliate border. * The Imperial Picture Gallery had its origins in the 16th and 17th centuries. It was not until the 18th century that the various holdings were brought together and displayed in Vienna's Stallburg. In 1776 Maria Theresa and her son, Emperor Joseph II decided to transfer the k.k. Gemäldegalerie from the Imperial Stables — a part of the city's Hofburg Imperial Palace — to the Upper Belvedere. Inspired by the idea of enlightened absolutism, the intention was to make the imperial collection accessible to the general public. The gallery opened five years later, making it one of the first public museums in the world.


*The French abbé Marc Antoine Laugier (1713-1769) can perhaps be called the first modern architectural philosopher. He published his Essai sur l'architecture in 1753, which then caused quite a stir. For Laugier, the ideal building consisted entirely of columns - columns carrying beams, carrying a roof. In 1753 no architect could have proposed anything so crazy as the abolition of walls. But Laugier was not an architect, he was a philosopher, and he was dealing in abstractions. He was establishing a principle of architectural beauty. In France his work was devoured and the building which embodies his principles in the most spectacular degree is the Panthéon in Paris. In the present work, of which we have the first

edition, Laugier recognized the grace of Gothic architecture. [Not in Millard, French]

* We have not been able to determine the identity of A.A. Lejeune who, according to the titlepage of the second and third work is the author of these works. However in the last one, on music, the name of a composer is mentioned. One of the songs is called "Ma Conversion, ou l'Amant Volage Devenu Constant. Chanson adressée à Madame Augustine P.***." The text is written by A.A. Lejeune and the music by P. Gaveau. This must be Pierre Gaveaux (Béziers 1761 - Paris 1825), singer and composer. Is this one of his original works or rather an existant song to which Lejeune has written the text? As to the Recueil de Divers Caractères d'Imprimerie: there is no mention whether these types have been imagined by him or copied, but to me they bear a resemblance to those of Gillé, who worked in Paris around the same time. A unique work.



* A curious little book that is an instructive sample of Celtic studies and eighteenth-century scholar-ship. It combines two branches of literary investigation and has, furthermore, some features resembling a bibliography. Valentin Ernst Loescher, born in 1673, is best known for his theological activities but also wrote the present work, a hand-book for students of Germanic linguistics. After the fashion of the day he included Gaulish and, so far as he knew them, other Celtic languages, since he believed them to be Germanic languages.



His booklet is problably the first conspectus of Celtic studies. Loescher declares the central importance of Germanic studies and supports his assertion by authorities who are not Germans. The title 'Literator Celta' is confusing, unless we realize that he regarded the Celtic languages as belonging to the Germanic stock. Consequently, he could properly include a chapter on Celtic names in classical authors. It is interesting to note a bibliography of published saga texts and a long discussion of the various Germanic languages and Germanic dialects. (c.f. A. * The Nouvelles Inventions was De L'Orme's first published work. The first edition appeared in 1561. Later editions were printed in 1568 and 1576 (with a reissue in 1578 which we have here) and as books 10 and 11 of De L'Orme's 1626 and 1648 editions of the treatise on architecture. The work transposes information on the principles of Renaissance architecture, acquired during De L'Orme's years in Rome, to an indigenous French building tradition. The author developed a traditional vernacular method of wooden construction, composed of dowels and short laminated wood members, into a system for economically building complex vaulted roofs. It included not only clas-

sical barrel and groin vaults, but also late medieval ribbed vaulting. This construction system would be used in both rural buildings and in some of the more important Parisian structures of the period. The Nouvelles Inventions contains the main surviving record of De L'Ormes lieu royal - a vaulted basilica - and of the rotunda at the Montmartre convent as it was rebuilt after 1599. It also provides the only documentation for some of the wood structures De l'Orme designed at Le Muetre, Lemours and Anet. The Nouvelles Inventions also demonstrates the complexity of De L'Orme's concept of classicism. Like Italian architectural theorists, he shows great respect for Vitruvius, Theophastus, Cato, and Pliny. However, he turns from classical precedent when he considers carpentry not in terms of types of wood or their treatment but in terms of stereometric calculations, as if he were discussing masonry construction as it had been associated with monumental Gothic architecture. It is clear that De L'Orme never renounced his national tradition with its mathematical orientation. Like his architecture and his architectural treatise, this work departs from the contemporary Italian publications in the field. * First edition. François de Los Rios (Antwerp 1727 - Lyon 1820) was born in a family of merchants. He began his working life as a bookseller's clerk in Paris and Italy; later on he visited England and the Netherlands and in 1767 he finally settled in Lyon as a bookseller. During his time in Lyon he sold many important books, especially Italian and Spanish books coming from the libraries of the Jesuits in Lyon, Tournon and Macon, and from the private libraries of the abbés Piole and Gindre. Apart from this work he wrote three other books, one of which (Oeuvres), published with a fictitious London address in 1789, is more or less autobiographic. In the introduction De Los Rios says that the present work, a classified list of 800 titles, was written to preserve the notes that he made during his life as a booksel-


ler. It is a unique or almost unique instance of a classified catalogue of rare books: a list of books already sold. The sale prices and an author index make this catalogue a reference work of lasting value. To a few copies the portrait of De Los Rios was added; the rarity of this portrait is stressed by Taylor. The authors named as those from whom the historical matter was compiled, are Moxon, Ames, Middleton, Atkyns, Watson, Palmer, &c. &c.; the practical instructions are "the united opinions of the most experienced in the trade." The latter is indeed the best part of the work. Following p. 132 is "a specimen of printing types by W. Caslon & Son, letter-founders in London" without date. There are 23 pages of flowers, including a number of fantastic and elegant designs made out of them; and 41 pages of type specimens, including music type and foreign alphabets. * Both works are first editions. I - (Maichel): An important early history of the French Royal Library and other famous Parisian libraries including the Bibliotheca Colbertina, St.-Germain, Mazarine, libraries of many religious orders etc. Horne (p. 561) says: "A work of great rarity. It is divided into two parts, the first of which contains an account of the rise and progress of the King's Library, and of nine other public libraries, at Paris. In the second part, the author discusses the use of public libraries, and the knowledge of literary history; and treats on a MS. de Mortibus Persecutorum, in the Colbertine Library, which is usually assigned to Lucius Caecilius, but which Michaelius ascribes to Lactantius. The sources of literary

history are next discussed, together with the right object of studies. Some notices are also introduced relative to the librarians and other literati then at Paris." Also Watt described this as being "a work of great rarity" and Michaud says: "Cette ouvrage est rempli de détails intéressants et il est assez recherché." Psaume p. 225 "Ouvrage rare en France". Daniel Maichel (1693-1752) was a professor of theology and philosophy at Tübbingen. II - (Reichard): A very uncommon book. The earliest history of the Austrian National Library, founded in the mid-16th century. Reichard (1679-1721), professor of philosophy at Wittenberg and later librarian at Jena, tells in detail of the major donors and accessions, the librarians etc. Very good copies.





* The Museum Pio-Clementino was founded in



1771 by Pope Clement XIV and greatly expanded by his successor Pius VI, an avid art collector. He constructed new spaces to house the expanding collection of Greek and Roman antiquities. The present work is the first edition of the first catalogue of the collections. It has been designed for portability and ease of use by visitors. This room-by-room guide leads visitors on a walking tour through the earliest curatorial museum of the Vatican complex. Written by Pasquale Massi of Cesena, identified as the cus-

* Very rare only edition of this little known work on the origin of the use of rag-paper, published by the great Dutch scholar of typography Gerard Meerman (1722-1771), author of the famous Origines Typographicae (1765). In 1762 he had put up a prize of 25 ducats for the person who could establish the date when rag-paper was first made. From all over Europe he received specimens and views on the subject, which renders this volume of international significance. It contains inter alia the contributions of and Meerman's correspondence with J.Chr. Gottsched, C.A. Bel, D.

Gerdesius, D. Longolius, G. Maiansius, A.C. Ducarel, J.S. Heringen, J.D. Michaelis and J.Ph. Murray. The two woodcuts are most probably the earliest reproductions of watermarks. Several of the contributions are also of great codicological and bibliographical interest.

* Only edition. "Michel Pignolet (Pinolet) de Montéclair (Andelot, Haute-Marne, bap. 4 Dec 1667 - Aumont, 22 [not 27] Sept 1737). French composer, theorist and teacher. He was the youngest of seven children of the weaver Adrien Pignolet and Suzanne Galliot. On 27 January 1676 he



entered the choir school at Langres Cathedral where he studied under Jean-Baptiste Moreau, director of the choir from October 1681 to February 1682. He added the name of 'Montéclair' (a fortress in Andelot) to his own some time after his arrival in Paris in 1687, but signed himself 'Pignolet dit Montéclair' as late as 1724. From the title-page of his Nouvelle méthode pour apprendre la musique (1709), we learn that he was 'formerly maître de la musique for the Prince of Vaudémont', whom he followed to Italy. Details of his Italian sojourn are unknown. ... Although not prolific, Montéclair wrote in most of the genres cultivated during the early 18th century in France, excepting only the keyboard. He was one of the most versatile of the generation between Lully's death (1687) and Rameau's advent as a stage composer (1733). ... As a theorist, Montéclair was less systematic and abstract than Rameau, 16 years his junior, with whom he quarrelled in an exchange of eight articles in the Mercure de France (nos.1, 3 and 7 are by Montéclair, who is not identified). ... The carefully illustrated section on the '18 principal ornaments in singing' in his Principes de musique makes this one of the most important sources on French vocal ornamentation of the early 18th century." * George Wolfgang Francis Panzer, the eminent German bibliographer was born at Sulzbach, in the Upper Palatinate, 1729, and was educated at Altdorf where he took the degree of D.D., and was at the same time ordained a minister in the Evangelical section of the Church. Books were his delight and study from youth to old age, his library being choice and extensive. He died at Nuremberg, in 1804. His own collection of bibles was acquired in 1790 by the Duke of Würtemmberg and is nowadays part of the Bible collection of the Stuttgarter Landesbibliothek. [see B&W].



* Third issue of the third book of Ambrosius Perling. This master calligrapher was born in Utrecht in 1657 or 1658 and became a citizen of Amsterdam in 1683. He kept a boarding school where calligraphy was taught and died in 1718. The first issues of the books written by Perling were published at his own expenses, the later ones were published (as in this case) by members of the family De Broen, engravers and publishers in Amsterdam. Ambrosius Perling reached a high fame during his lifetime as the last writing master who could hold in honor the calligraphic tradition of the Dutch republic. De Broen advertised his scripts as produced by "the jewel of the writing masters" and in fact the fame of Perling as unsurpassed calligrapher lasted well into the XIX century, both in Holland and abroad. Especially in England the influence of Perling was great. S. Morison in his introduction to the book of Heal on the history of calligraphy in England stresses the important rôle played by Perling alongside the Frenchmen Barbedor and Matherot. "While XVIth and early XVIIth century Italian handwriting had still been formed in a rather compressed and angular manner, the Dutch masters developed a broader and more rounded variant which, so far as writing line is concerned, was written at a wider sloping angle. This hand, which could be written more quickly, was imitated and developed further by a number of English masters ..." (Croiset van Uchelen). Specimens of Perling's writing were reproduced by English masters as Snell, Champion and Bickham. Also in Spain Perling's influence was felt, as demonstrated by the insertion of a letter by him in the manual of Servidori (1787). This suite corresponds to the issue IIIb of this book in the Perling bibliography attempted by Croiset van Uchelen. The names of the engravers are G.



and J. De Broen and the plates are disposed mostly according to Croiset's description, with two inversions. The first edition of the Schat-Kamer was published in 1685 and comprised only 17 leaves. 



* Second edition of this work that was printed for the first time in the same year under the title 'Essai historique sur l'Imprimerie'. The author, Jules



Louis Melchior Porthmann was the son of a printer, and was born in Paris in 1790 and died in 1820. He was not even 20 years old when he took over his father's printing house and in the same year published the present work. "The book is eloquently written, in the most eulogistic strain, but does not contain any historical or technical matter. There are however many laudatory references to early Parisian printers." (Bigmore & Wyman about this second edition). The first edition contained 15 pages of notes at the end that have been omitted in the second edition and the title is changed into: 'Eloge Historique sur l'Imprimerie', probably because some of the reviews that were written on publication think more of it as an 'Eloge' as as an 'Essai'. Two of the reviews are reprinted in part in the third (enlarged) edition. The

Journal de l'Empire says about this work: «Cette brochure est mal nommé: c'est un discours académique, un éloge, un hymne, un poème, c'est tous ce que l'on voudra; mais n'est point un essai historique. Je n'y trouve point ce calme, sage et grave qui sied à l'histoire et à la dissertation... La lecture de ce petit ouvrage m'a prouvé que l'auteur a de l'esprit, de l'imagination; qu'il a beaucoup de facilité pour écrire; qu'il a lu avec fruit quelques-uns des auteurs qui ont traité de l'imprimerie, Prosper Marchand, entre autres. Joseph Ignace van Praet (1724-1792) was the son of a cloth dealer, and he became one himself until he changed his trade and became a printer and a bookseller - not without problems with the bookseller's guild though, as they didn't need another printer/bookseller. That was in 1762. This must be his very first catalogue! All twenty titles that are here presented are in French, and published in France. Van Praet, already in 1762, became the

official printer of the town of Bruges. Joseph Ignace van Praet is the father of Joseph-Basile van Praet (1754-1837) who became a librarian at the Bibliothèque Nationale in Paris.



At first the manufacturer's identity was written by hand on the paper, but printed marks soon followed, in many cases echoing the watermark of the sheets themselves. Collectors are normally interested in the marks as such, disregarding the full extent of the complete wrapper. Items in collections





* Work on the Bruce Rogers World Bible lasted over four years. In 1945 The World Publishing Company was engaged in refurbishing the format




of its extensive list of Bibles and were forcibly struck anew by something that had only vaguely disturbed them in the past - the lack of a contemporary American folio Bible of noble proportions and in the great Bible tradition and they resolved to remedy this lack. Bruce Rogers, who had already designed the Oxford Lectern Bible was chosen for the project and his choice of type was one of Fred Goudy's lesser-used but most beautiful creations, the face Newstyle. But that had previously been cut only in the 18-point size for hand composition. The great length of the book called for machine composition, and the close fitting required by such work made it necessary for many of the characters to be redesigned. Thus Goudy's Newstyle, slightly modified by Bruce Rogers with Mr. Goudy's permission for the Bruce

Rogers World Bible, was re-issued for machine composition and renamed Goudy Bible. In the prospectus to the work Bruce Rogers explaines the decorative treatment of the book: "The first edition of the King James Bible in 1611 was lavishly decorated with fairly good woodcuts... The new World Bible, in its turn, will be fittingly decorated, with headings to the sixty-six books, initial letters, and a bordered title page made up from type ornaments or flowers. These, together with the type selected, are intended to give a slightly oriental flavor to the volume, indicative of the Syriac and Hebrew sources of the text on which the King James translators based their classic version." A truly magnificent work.

Numerous illustrations can be found throughout the work but the most important ones are the 18 double-page plates that were designed by Royllet himself and engraved by Baillieul, the elder, engraver for the king, who, according to Royllet was the only person able to make these intricate plates.



The supplement has a separate titlepage: Supplementum Catalogus librorum tam impressum quam manuscriptum Bibliothecae publicae Universitatis Lugduno-Batavae. Leiden (Samuel Lugtmans & Cornelius Haak), 1741, but the pagination is continuous (the supplement occupies pages 501-534). Incidentally there is a substantial unpaginated index placed between them of 60ff.



The Catalogue of the University Library at Leyden has a certain air of modernity in its carefully listed holdings in theology, jurisprudence, medicine, philosophy, philology, political economy, history, belles-lettres, classics, numismatics, etc. A single chapter enumerates the celebrated collection of 1993 Oriental manuscripts in Persian, Turkish, Hebrew, Armenian, Coptic, etc. Separate chapters list the special collections donated by Huygens, Vossius, Perizonius, De Smet, and others. Rare [Brunet 31496 says that this is one of the most representative sources of Oriental manuscript holdings].

This section ends with general praise for Germany as the nation responsible for the invention of printing. The second part of the text is a collection of Latin poems and translations from Greek, mostly on the subject of inebration; all except the translations from Greek are the work of Estienne himself.



* This five line autograph letter by Lord Stanhope's stereotype printer was issued presumably at a time of financial embarassment and is from Wilson to his solicitors, Mill & Harrison of Clements Lane Lombard Street, requesting his lease as he has "immediate occasion for it." This is beneath an eight line printed circular letter from Wilson at the Stereotype Office Camden Town, dated April 1822 and announcing his intention to wind up his stereotype and bookselling business and appoint Mill & Harrison to settle his affairs. Wilson was the primary promotor of the Stereotype printing process which involved producing a plaster of paris mould from made up formes of type and then producing a single solid




plate for each page with a thin layer of lead. The process reduced printing costs as resetting of type was no longer necessary in reprinted editions. The process was rediscovered in the early 19th century by Lord Stanhope, after invention and patenting the process in 1725 by William Ged, and developed commercially by Andrew Wilson who, in 1803, under his lordship's patronage, commenced business as a stereotyper, in which he continued for several years. He did not receive much encouragement and then took to publishing, without success. In 1804 the invention was offered to the University of Cambridge, but differences arose, and the matter fell to the ground. [see Bigmore & Wyman on Wilson].


* Thomas J. Wise (1859-1937) was a British bibliophile, bibliographer, biblioklept, and literary forger. Concentrating on first editions of Victorian writers of poetry and drama, he assembled a major library which after his death was sold to the British Museum for GBP 66,000. He named his collection the Ashley Library after the road in Crouch Hill, London, where he once lived. Wise made a serious study of the writers he collected and published an important series of bibliographies as well as several catalogues of his own library. For his forgeries he had the ingenious idea of printing in pamphlet form part of an already published edition and giving it an earlier date, thus creating first editions for profitable sale to trusting bibliophiles and libraries. More than fifty examples were exposed as frauds by John Carter and Graham Pollard in 1934. (c.f. Glaiser, Glossary of the Book).



* Francis Wrangham (1769-1842) assembled a library that contained over 14000 volumes. An exceptional library because he preferred an obscure book, which for one reason or another was (and must always remain) very hard to find, to a notorious high-spot which - though also of great rarity - could be relied upon to head the bill in any auction or catalogue. He was the sort of bibliophile who loved to choose his own quarry and hunt it; and he measured the value of his library, not by the total of its current prices or by its place in competition with those of his book-collecting contemporaries, but by the number of ingenious discoveries and lucky captures which he himself knew that it contained. This catalogue was printed in 1826 in 70 copies but no fewer than 51 copies were still in folded sheets when Wrangham's library was sold by Mr. Leigh Sotheby in two ten-day sales in July and November-December 1843. The first sale comprised 2,669 lots and the second 3,089. Most descriptions in this catalogue have extensive notes and the preface written by Wrangham is on his collection. (cf. M. * Daniel Albert Wyttenbach (August 7, 1746, Bern – January 17, 1820, Oegstgeest) was a German Swiss classical scholar. A student of Hemsterhuis, Valckenaer and Ruhnken, he was an exponent of the methods of criticism which they established, and with them he laid the foundations of modern Greek scholarship. At the end of 1771 he moved to Amsterdam where a bit later he started issuing his Bibliotheca critica, which appeared at intervals for the next thirty years. The object professed in the preface was to help in rescuing classical studies from the neglect into which they had fallen, by creating an interest in new works of merit, through critical notices, embodying the results of original research by the writer himself. It was in fact a kind of critical review written by one man. The methods of criticism were in the main those established by Hemsterhuis, and carried on by Valckenaer and Ruhnken, and the publication was accepted by the learned all over Europe. In 1799 he became the thirteenth librarian at the University of Leiden.

* Hermann Zapf, born in Nuremberg, Germany, in 1918, taught himself calligraphy from the books of Rudolf Koch and Edward Johnston. He has had a distinguished career in type design and typography. Hermann Zapf is recognised as one of the world's leading type designers and typographers. In his books Zapf shows an extraordinary sense for the balancing of type and space. He often uses a calligraphic letter, a handwritten word,



or a chaste ornament (perhaps blind-embossed) to set off his otherwise perfectly simple, harmonious title pages. 



* On 29 floréal an X (19 mai 1802) Napoleon Bonaparte, 'Premier Consul' at that time, passed a law to have the Canal Saint-Martin constructed, together with the Canal Saint-Denis and the Canal de l'Ourcq. The project of the engineer Pierre Simon Girard (1765-1836) was chosen to resolve the problems of drinking water navigation in Paris. In 1790 he had won a price of the Academy for a work on the construction of canals and in 1798 he published the first work on the resistance of materials. By creating these canals there was the additional benefit that a shortcut of the Seine was created. So ships could avoid the difficult center of Paris and ports could be built. Building of the canal Saint-Martin started in 1805 at both ends but the canal was only finished in 1825. Numerous difficulties related to constructing a canal in such an urban area had to be surmounted. The present document, signed by Girard objects to a change that has been made in the initial project which wants to let the canal pass underneath the Hospital Saint-Louis. The author explains all his objections in detail. Important document for the history of the urbanisation of Paris.


^{*} First edition of an interesting attempt at an early classified bibliography. As is noted in the preface, the book is not destined for "Bibliomanes" but for "personnes du monde", in particular young people and

young ecclesiasts. Over 2000 works are listed divided into six chapters: Literature, Eloquence, History, Philosophy, Religion and Miscellanious. There is a preliminary chapter that gives a short list of books that can be used to study books. The author has devised an intricate system of abbreviations which allows to classify each work. These abbreviations are explained in three tables at the beginning of the work. The first one describes the quality of the work i.e. whether the work is useful, instructive, delicate, elegant, logic or can only be read with special guidance, etc. The second table indicates the kind of reader that might find the work useful, i.e. educated people who have religious doubts, people that are uneducated and to whom one might like to give a book, young people and lastly, the Young and women. And finally the third table lists the religious affiliation of each author. Of Brunet, Manuel du Libraire et de l'amateur des Livres. 4 vol. in-80 he says: «b. meth. r. VIII» or translated: «bon, méthodique, ouvrage qu'on ne doit lire que avec réserve et d'après conseil» and according to him it is suitable only for groupe VIII which are: «les littérateurs chrétiens». The work contains an extensive author index. Charles Joseph Gloriot was a Jesuit missonary who had been forced to leave France during the Revolution and eventually settled in Besançon where he established a school. *The first edition of this work was published in Dijon in 1818 and preceded Senefelder's treatise. This is the second edition, but the first one with the bookbinding section. This second part on bookbinding is the first work to describe how to marble the edges of a book and devotes 8 pages to that subject alone. Mairet also talks a lot about colours. Bigmore & Wyman say: "The lithographic matter extends over 68 pages. In the preface it is stated that the previous edition had been quickly sold off, and the author had been solicited to issue a second. In complying with this request he added the matter relating to bookbinding, &c. It is noticable that whereas in the title-page of 1818 he was described as a stationer, in that of 1824 he is described as a bookbinder and lithographic printer. He seems to have gained a great reputation for the excellence and elegance of his binding, M. Peignot, the bibliophile, awarding him high comendation on this account. The new edition was printed in a far superior manner to the old one, and the plates are much better executed, marking the progress which had been made in the interval between the two publications." And although the first edition is much rarer, this one is not at all common. [Bigmore & Wyman II, p. 14; Pollard & Potter 52].
